

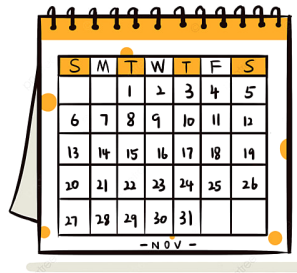
What Comes After "in"

When we use the word "in", we usually talk about two things:

1. General Times

We say "in" to describe a time **inside** a bigger time:

- Months (in May, in August)



- Years (in 1997, in 2024)



- Parts of the day (in the morning, in the afternoon, in the evening)



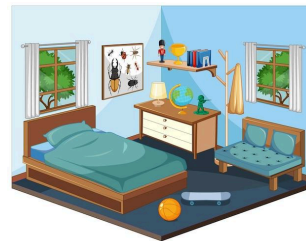
Examples:

- My birthday is **in June**.
- We eat breakfast **in the morning**.

2. Places

We also say "in" for places we can be **inside** of:

- Rooms (in the kitchen, in the bedroom)



- Buildings (in the mall, in the school)



- Things (in the box, in the bag)



Examples:

- Mom is cooking **in the kitchen**.
- My books are **in my backpack**.

You can think of it like this: just like you can be **inside** a place, you can also be **inside** a time.

So we say "in August" like we're inside the month of August!

Or we say "in 2025" like we're inside the year of 2025!

And we say "in the afternoon" when we're inside the hours of 12:00 PM - 5:00 PM!
